Arizona State University Wellness and Health Promotion Sexual Violence Prevention and Education Program (ASU SVPEP)

ASU SVPEP offers a comprehensive program in which college students are provided education for individual reflection and skills building, social marketing to reinforce positive community norms, and opportunities for structured involvement to contribute to violence prevention.

Education: ASU offers online education and presentations to enhance the student experience in class, as a member of a student group or organization. Topics that are addressed through education include but are not limited to: developing healthy relationships, the continuum of violence, and definitions of consent and sexual assault.

Student Involvement: Students are invited to get involved as Peer Educators, Interns, Student Employees, and Student Volunteers. Students may assist with awareness events, staffing information tables and serving on committees and workgroups, and program development and evaluation. Students participate in training that prepares them for the level of work they will do to promote violence prevention.

Positive Community Norms: Social marketing posters, brochures, and bulletin board kits are placed in all student housing facilities to reinforce education and skills gained in class and online. In addition, ads reflecting the same messages are placed in the student newspaper to reach a wider student audience.

About ADHS Sexual Violence Prevention and Education Program

The Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) Sexual Violence and Prevention Program (SVPEP) receives funds from the Centers for Disease Control for programs aimed at preventing sexual violence and rape in Arizona. For the past seven years, through community level cooperative interventions, SVPEP has provided prevention education on rape and teen dating violence to students, professionals, and community members in Arizona.

Currently, there are seven agencies in three counties receiving funds to support a variety of primary educational programs throughout the state. Target populations include students in elementary through high school, college students, women, medical and legal professionals, law enforcement personnel, and Latino and Native American youth.

Funded activities include:

- Educational seminars
- Trainings for professionals
- Preparation of informational materials
- Education/training programs for students/campus personnel
- Education to increase knowledge about date rape drugs
- Other efforts to increase awareness of the facts about, or to help prevent sexual assault, including efforts to increase awareness in underserved communities, and individuals with disabilities
- Operation of hotlines
