Note: Statistics are provided for cities with populations of 10,000 and over. According to the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, violent crime consists of four offenses: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and assault. Forcible rape is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will and includes assaults or attempts to commit rape by force or threat of force. Statutory rape (without force) and other sex offenses are not included.
